The Seattle Genealogical Society Spring 2012 Seminar features national speaker, George G. Morgan, of The Genealogy Guys Podcasts on Saturday, 19 May, 2012. His range of genealogical interests and speaking topics is among the most diverse in the genealogical speaking community. With the advent of electronic research

materials, he has become a recognized expert in using software programs, databases, Internet resources, online databases, Internet genealogical mailing lists and message boards, search engines, directories, subscription databases, and all the major online services around the world. He will bring his knowledge of technology and his passion for genealogy in an informative seminar. This year we will be meeting in the cushy comfort of the McEachern Auditorium at the Museum of History and Industry (MOHAI.) Last fall you voted for the topics that George Morgan would present and the winning topics are:

- **Bring'Em Back to Life: Developing an Ancestor Profile**

The people we're tracing participated in the life of their historical times, led complex lives, and interacted with one another. Organizing the information we collect into a biographical profile can help you begin to recognize character traits and decision patterns. This seminar presents a methodology and a structured model for taking the details you collect about your ancestor and creating a biographical profile.

- **Advanced Genealogical Research Methodologies for the Internet**

We'll examine a variety of genealogical and newspaper databases, how to use search engines to locate genealogy data across the Internet, and how to use social media to research your ancestry.

- **New Ways to Research our Roots**

This session takes the attendees from our beginnings to the future of genealogical research. It concentrates on products, services, technology, and initiatives that are advancing our research each day. Learn about new research resources available today and trends into the future with books, records, digitization, DNA, and more.

- **Sidestep Genealogy**

Brick wall research blocks are inevitable. It is then that we must use our most creative research skills, and move to other family members. Sidestep genealogy means researching these alternative individuals, their records, the places that they lived, and other resources.

George G. Morgan is president of Aha! Seminars, Inc. He also managed the development of an award-winning PC-based EDI software package. He worked for Advantis, a subsidiary of IBM. He is co-host of The Genealogy Guys© Podcast at <<http://genealogyguys.com>>, the longest running genealogy podcast in the world. They began producing The Genealogy GuysSM Videocast at <<http://genealogyguys.blip.tv>> in 2009.

George is the author of eight landmark genealogy books: *The Genealogy Forum on America Online: The Official User's Guide*; the award-winning *Your Family Reunion: How to Plan It, Organize It, and Enjoy It*. His award-winning book, *How to Do Everything with Your Genealogy*, has been a part of its highly successful "How to Do Everything" series. Seattle's Irish Heritage Club will host an all-day Irish Workshop as a prelude to Irish Week. Fintan Mullan, Director of The Ulster Historical Foundation, and Brian Trainor, former Director of Northern Ireland's Public Records Office, will present a full day seminar and workshop on Irish Genealogy. The Ulster Historical Foundation is a long-established genealogical research and publishing agency offering extensive knowledge on the sources available for tracing Irish and Scots-Irish ancestors in any part of Ireland. Services include online databases of over 2 million records, genealogy and history books, and personal ancestral research. Representatives of the SGS and Eastside Irish Interest groups will be available with information tables. Topics include: **Introduction to Irish and Scots-Irish Family History Research, Eighteenth Century Emigration from Ireland to America & Sources for Its Study, Records Relating to the Different Churches in Ireland, Researching the Farming Community in 18th & 19th Century, The Ulster Plantation: Sources for 17th Century Families.**

Right now this is just a "placeholder" for a whole new section of the website that's in development. Our wonderful Drupal volunteers are working with us to figure out how best to create the member log-ins and to keep them updated and accurate. THE SEATTLE 1890 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Seattle 1890 Census Project began last summer as an effort by S.G.S. to offer those researching early Seattle families a substitute 1890 compendium of Seattle area residents. Phase I, Seattle's portion of the 1889 Territorial census, is nearing completion, and volunteers will be honored at Volunteer Appreciation Day on April 16th.

Seattle's portion of the census was enumerated in July 1889, weeks after the devastation of the Great Seattle Fire, with some 31,000 entries for Seattle's four wards, plus the precincts of Dwamish, Fremont, Green Lake and Smiths Cove. 155 packets of approximately 200 names each were created, and these have been diligently read by a group of 13 SGS volunteers over the past several months.

Kate Johnston has been the project registrar, who has distributed packets to proofreaders. Sue Melville has been responsible for entering corrections to the original 1889 transcription.

Volunteer proofreaders for Phase I of the project have been: Dona Bubelis, Natalie Cowan, Christine Hanley, Nancy Hevly, Tina Hollingsworth, Kirsten Jensen, JoAnne King, Marilyn McGuire, Virgil Morgan, Nancy Parks, Emily Phillips, Winifred Price, Judy Tomassene, Doug Whalley, and Charlotte Wixon. Their work has been invaluable to the completion of this project.

Phase II will begin this spring and will involve transcribing the 1891 Polk City Directory for Seattle and merging the information, including locational data, with the information from the 1889 Census. The 1891 Polk Directory included information gathered through March 1891. Phase III will involve adding the 1890 Ballard Census to our database.

BOARD NEWS

After a short break for the Christmas holidays, the SGS Board has kept busy on the following projects:

- accepted the resignation of Cary Bright as Director of Education and appointed Lynn Magnuson to fill her unexpired term (through May 31, 2012)
- developing and adopting a revised Accounting Policy & Procedures that accurately reflect how we process income and expenses and keep our financial records
- developing and adopting a new Copyright Policy to protect SGS and our Bulletin article submitters and program presenters from plagiarism (thank you, Amber Brock Case)
- continuing to work through the many good recommendations of last summer's Performance Audit Committee (Karen Portzer, Bob Lynch, Charlotte Wixon). We have drafted an Operational Calendar and are working on better organizing our Policy & Procedure Manual
- completed the reporting requirements for our 2011 Sustained Operations Grant from King County 4Culture
- writing and submitting a request to 4Culture for funding for digitization of SGS documents (some of them "discovered" in our store room by our wonderful Archives Committee)
- developing and adopting a new pro-rated membership policy to avoid the "gaming" of the old pro-rated price structure
- discussing and understanding our overall SGS finances which depend heavily on revenue from seminars and donations
- discussing increasing our membership dues (if passed by the Board, members would vote on the proposal in April)
- hosting a second successful Library Work Day on January 29th (THANK YOU to all who came and helped)
- hosting a Library Open House on Saturday, February 11th (special thanks to Michelle Khoun for organizing and to Linda Fitzgerald for giving two "Getting Started" presentations)
- investigating setting up an SGS online "store"
- organizing volunteers to list more of SGS's surplus books on Ebay
- working with Anna Chavelle, chair of the Nominating Committee, to find qualified candidates for all elective offices
- probably most important of all, we've negotiated a new 5-year lease with our landlady with the rent fixed at our current level for two years. We can opt out after that if we can't come to agreement on an appropriate rental rate. And the owner is working with us to develop some new parking options for us.

SGS to Participate in GiveBIG Day

GiveBIG is a one-day, online charitable giving event coordinated by The Seattle Foundation designed to inspire people to give generously to nonprofit organizations in our community. SPL Century 21 Digital Collection

The Seattle Public Library is excited to announce the launch of its newest digital collection, the Century 21 Exposition Digital Collection <www.spl.org/century21>. This collection contains books, brochures, reports, and other textual documents from the Hugh and Jane Ferguson Seattle Room, as well as over 1500 black-and-white photographs of the fair taken by Werner Lenggenhager, documenting construction work, buildings, exhibits, crowds, and events. Together, these items tell the story of the World's Fair from planning to demolition.

The Century 21 Exposition (or Seattle World's Fair) took place in Seattle from April 21 to October 21, 1962. The first major American world's fair after World War II, it presented an optimistic vision of a future improved through science and technology, and promoted Seattle to the world as a space-age city. Exhibits focused on industry, commerce, science, and the future, but also included fine arts, food, and entertainment. Ten million people attended the fair, and it left Seattle with many lasting legacies, including the Space Needle, the Monorail, and the Seattle Center.

The launch of this digital collection is timed to coincide with the fiftieth anniversary celebrations of the Century 21 Exposition. This is an exciting new resource for students, researchers, and anyone interested in the origins of the Space Needle, the Monorail, or the Seattle Center!

HELP SAVE THE SOCIAL SECURITY DEATH INDEX (SSDI)

There is a move afoot in Congress to restrict access to the SSDI. Genealogists doing US research located both in and outside the United States rely on the Social Security Death Index (SSDI), which is the commercial name of the Death Master File (DMF). The Death Master File is a computer database file made available by the United States Social Security Administration since 1980 as part of the Freedom of Information Act. Your help is needed to help Save the Social Security Death Index (SSDI) as an accessible resource.

Genealogists support Congress's intent to protect Americans from improper usage of their personal information, and to protect them from identity theft, but rarely, has it been documented that an individual's identity is violated by access to SSDI; rather, the violations occur due to computer breaches from government and private enterprises.

The Records Preservation and Access Committee (RPAC) and its sponsoring organizations: Federation of Genealogical Societies, National Genealogical Society, and the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies are leading the protest. The comments by Social Security Commissioner Michael J. Astrue and his vision of genealogical access to the SSDI is condescending at best and even insulting as he refer to genealogists as "little old ladies in tennis shoes." He wants to have researchers wait 75 years for the SSDI to become available to the public and 125 for public access to birth records in every state. A bill HR 3475 Keeping IDs Safe Act of 2011 has been introduced by Congressman Sam Johnson (R-Texas), chair of the House Ways & Means Committee. If enacted, this bill would effectively end public access to the death file

Let your representatives in Washington know that you do NOT support bill H.R. 3475. Remind them that information on many deaths is easily available in newspapers and obituaries as well; the ability to easily determine who is already dead makes it easier for agencies to COMBAT fraud.
